Denver Botanic Gardens' 2021 Spring Plant Sale is online again to offer a broad selection of plants for gardeners of every skill level. Plant inventory includes: Annuals, Aquatics, Container Garden in a Bag, Fruits & Berries, Grown at the Gardens, Herbs, Houseplants, Perennial Classics, Plant Select®, Rock Alpine, Roses, Specialty Succulents, Summer Bulbs, Vegetables and Water-Smart.

Shop the best selection a day before the online store opens to the public. A limited number of tickets go on sale March 30.

April 27-29 – Online store open to all, no ticket required

The online store will be open April 27, 10 a.m. through April 29, 4 p.m., while supplies last.

- A plant list and detailed instructions for using the online store will be available mid-April.
- Members receive 10 percent off all purchases.
- **Curbside pick-up May 6-9** at the Gardens' York Street location on the top deck of the parking structure.
- Shop remaining inventory during the "last chance" **in-person sale May 10-11**. Free admission but reservations are required; plant inventory will be limited.
