This juried exhibition, on view October 1, 2022 – January 8, 2023, showcases a variety of media including colored pencil, watercolor, scratchboard and gouache and a wide range of plants including strawberries, peppers, radishes, orchids, anthurium, cacti and castilleja.

Abundant Future: Cultivating Diversity in Garden, Farm and Field

Celebrating the diverse plants we rely on in our daily lives, *Abundant Future: Cultivating Diversity in Garden, Farm and Field*, features 41 botanical illustrations of domestic, heirloom and wild plants and stories about their histories created by artists from across the world. This exhibition, on view October 8, 2022 – January 15, 2023, showcases a vast array of crop diversity and explores the importance of protecting our agricultural heritage from the threats of climate change, pests and disease.

Abundant Future: Cultivating Diversity in Garden, Farm, and Field, The Fourth ASBA/New York Botanical Garden Triennial was developed by the American Society of Botanical Artists and The New York Botanical Garden. The exhibition was previously presented at New York Botanical Garden, Tucson Botanical Garden and Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum (Wausau, WI).
