Justin Favela: Vistas in Color

June 11 - October 1, 2023



Justin Favela: Vistas in Color features a site-specific work created for Denver Botanic Gardens. The floor-to-ceiling desert landscape mural is made of piñata tissue paper, spanning the entire ellipse-shaped Bonfils-Stanton Gallery. Inspiration for the mural design comes from images of desert landscapes across the United States and Mexico, including some from the artist's own own road trips, as well as desert imagery painted on lowrider cars. The exhibition is on view June 11 – October 1, 2023, and is included with general admission.

Favela designs his murals to respond to their locale, taking influence from the communities, history and culture of the region. Denver community members will help install *Vistas in Color* at the Gardens.

commissioned by museums including the Denver Art Museum, Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, AR, and El Museo del Barrio, NYC. He is the recipient of the 2021 Joan Mitchell Foundation Fellowship. Favela holds a BFA in fine art from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.
