BOTANICAL ILLUSTRATION PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Take one class or take them all! Classes, workshops and lectures are for anyone interested in scientific illustration.

The School of Botanical Art & Illustration (SBAI) at Denver Botanic Gardens was founded more than 40 years ago and continues to be among the few remaining programs of its kind in the world. The botanical illustration program focuses not only on artistic techniques but also on plants themselves. Courses in botany, visits to our herbaria, library and opportunities to learn from staff horticulturists and researchers round out the curriculum and provide important context for the practice of botanical illustration. Our highly interactive studio classes, held in the Freyer – Newman Center, have low student-to-instructor ratios and include demonstrations, studio time and feedback in addition to discussions and real-world opportunities for exhibition and publication.

About the Program

The School of Botanical Art & Illustration continues to evolve and respond to feedback from our community. The program now offers two pathways of study: Foundational and Advanced. At either level, students may simply take courses or prepare and submit a portfolio required to graduate with a certificate. While we continue to honor and uphold the rigor and tradition of the former Certificate Program, this new format provides pathways for all students to move through the program in ways that fit into busy lives. Learn more about program requirements, expectations and opportunities online.

Elective Courses and Credit

Elective courses are designed to expose students to new instructors, build experience with new media and increase background knowledge of botanical art. It is strongly recommended that students take relevant elective courses throughout the year. Guest instructor workshops qualify for elective credit. Students who attend Intersections lectures receive one elective credit hour. Students can receive a maximum of 15 credit hours from these lectures. Pre-registration is required. See page 3 for lecture schedule.



Completion and Certificate Applications

If pursuing the Foundational or Advanced Certificate, students must also prepare a portfolio for review by a jury of botanical artists, botanists and curators. The portfolio consists of five finished botanical plates (11 x 14 inches), one each in the following media:

- Graphite pencil
- Colored pencil
- Pen and ink
- Watercolor
- Artist's choice (a plate in any media and of any subject taught within the School's curriculum)

Deadline to submit the application and completed portfolio is October 7, 2024.

Scholarship Program

With ongoing support from Botanical Interests, the SBAI scholarship program provides tuition for courses in botanical illustration.



The carbon dust technique was developed by medical illustrators in the early 20th century and is characterized by subtle and precise gradations of grey values. Using a combination of carbon pencil lines and carbon dust applied with brushes, this unique medium produces rich tonal renderings with the value range of charcoal and the precision of watercolor. 
