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River's Voice: Textiles by Alexandra Kehayoglou

April 14 – December 8, 2024



Alexandra Kehayoglou's large-sale carpet works highlight Argentina's Paraná de las Palmas River and the surrounding wetlands—rich in natural beauty and home to millions of organisms, but threatened by agricultural expansion and development. **River's Voice: Textiles by Alexandra Kehayoglou** is on view in Denver Botanic Gardens' Freyer – Newman Center April 14 – December 8, 2024 and is included with general admission.

The scale of the 12 works in *River's Voice* varies from one monumental work that is nearly 40 feet high and 14 feet wide to smaller works that are around three feet by five feet. The centerpiece of the exhibition, *Paraná de las Palmas River*, was recently on display at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. and extends across the gallery floor. Visitors are invited to remove their shoes and walk on the work.

Kehayoglou and her family moved to an island in the wetlands surrounding Argentina's Paraná de las Palmas River in 2018. She felt a strong connection with the landscape and thinks of her art as a way to introduce people to the magic and beauty of this endangered place, offering hope for its renewal and a flourishing ecological future.

The compositions are created from drawings, drone photography, videos and memories. Kehayoglou uses a handheld tufting gun and leftover wool materials from her family's carpet factory in Argentina to construct the works. Since she uses secondhand materials, she doesn't always have a color match for the featured plant and landscapes, so she creates color in an impressionistic way, using different colors of yarn. Once the carpet is woven, she uses scissors to trim and sculpt shapes and texture to create a dimensional environment.

About the Artist

Alexandra Kehayoglou is an Argentinean artist who splits her time between Buenos Aires, Argentina and Athens, Greece. She is primarily interested in bringing together art and craft as a call for environmental awareness and action. Her work has been exhibited throughout the world including a 2014 collaboration with fashion designer Dries Van Noten in which she created a 164-foot-long carpet that was used as a

runway at Paris Fashion Week. She has also been included in Design Miami/Basel (2016), Antigone Now festival, New York (2016), The Triennial of The National Gallery of Victoria, Melbourne (2017) and exhibitions around the world. She won the Konex Award from Argentina in 2022.
