

Botanical Illustration Program

Overview

Founded more than 45 years ago, the School of Botanical Art & Illustration is one of the few remaining programs of its kind training the next generation of botanical illustrators. In the age of AI, computer animation and digital photography, botanical illustration serves as a vital bridge between art and science. Botanical illustrations, even more than photographs, are uniquely suited to convey important information about plant identification and complex plant structures, in addition to providing a record of plants over time.

Students at the School of Botanical Art & Illustration hone their skills through a well-rounded art curriculum supplemented by courses in botany, lectures from horticulturists and researchers and visits to the herbaria, library and art galleries. Highly interactive studio courses, held in the Freyer – Newman Center or online, have low student-to-instructor ratios and include ample demonstrations, studio time and feedback.



Drawing in Pencil 1



Gain confidence in your drafting skills and improve your future drawings. This class uses only graphite pencil, but the principles apply to all media.

Colored Pencil 1

Watercolor 1

Drawing skills and color mixing experience are combined to further explore watercolor paint. From flat and graded washes to highlights and drybrush detail, discover the delight of putting brush and pigment to paper for transparent watercolor. Demonstrations and practical exercises show you how to build washes for depth of tone and shading, and how to create soft and hard edges.

Colored Pencil 2

Watercolor 2

Discover colors that enhance perspective and depth, then learn invaluable techniques to implement final details and fix those inevitable "mistakes."

Pen and Ink 2


Join us to celebrate both the 2024 and 2025 graduates and view the Graduate Showcase. A reception will follow for graduates and their guests.

Visiting Artists

Dr. Linda Ann Vorobik, Ph.D.

Linda Ann Vorobik is a botanist and botanical artist from Lopez Island, WA. She has illustrated for scientific publications and teaches extensively around the United States.

Scientific Illustration for Beginners

Onsite: Thursday, September 25, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Prerequisites: None

Scientific illustrations are highly precise, based on museum reference specimens, and executed with respect to several standards. In this workshop you'll be guided through illustrating one subject adhering to these standards from each stage including pencil drawing, composition, editorial work, and final inking.

Botany for Artists (3 Day Intensive)

During this three-day hands-on workshop with botanist and illustrator Dr. Linda Ann Vorobik, learn about plant parts, and how to label and draw them. Through careful observation, dissection and in class discussion, observe and draw a variety of leaves, stems, flowers and fruits and learn important botanical terminology. This class fulfills the botany requirement for the Botanical Illustration Certificate Program.

Scaling Techniques for Botanical Artists

Hatching and Stippling Using Pen Nib and Ink

Painting Apples in Watercolor


